Re: Urgent Need to Fully Fund School-Based Mental Health Workforce Development Grants in FY 2026

Dear Senators Ernst, Padilla, Smith, and Tillis, and Representatives Bacon, Beyer, Gonzales, and Salinas:

We are deeply grateful for your leadership of the Senate and Congressional Mental Health Caucuses. Your steadfast commitment to addressing the nation's youth mental health crisis has brought much-needed attention to these challenges and built bipartisan consensus around ensuring that every young person has access to care and hope for the future.

As FY 2026 appropriations negotiations advance, we respectfully urge the Mental Health Caucuses to **support the Senate proposal** to direct what remains of \$190 million in School Safety National Activities funding—after Project SERV and continuation awards—to be split between the **Mental Health Services Professional Demonstration Grant (MHSP)** and the **School-Based Mental Health Services Grant (SBMH)** programs. These programs were

authorized following the tragic Uvalde school shooting as a cornerstone of the nation's strategy to strengthen the school-based mental health workforce and keep our students safe, healthy, and ready to learn.

The evidence shows that the MHSP and SBMH programs work. Between May and December 2023 alone, data from a single cohort of grantees - though not representative of all grants during that period - show that the funding supported over 775,000 students, hired 1,296 new providers, trained 1,767 professionals, and placed 1,191 graduate students in practicums and internships. In classrooms across America, these investments are helping children manage anxiety, reconnect to school, and stay on track to graduate.

Despite this success, the need remains significant. Nationally, schools have reached only 47% of recommended staffing levels for school psychologists, 66% for counselors, and 42% for social workers. Without sustained investment, schools risk losing critical professionals and progress at a time when students' needs are rising, not falling.

This is not a partisan issue. Americans across the political spectrum recognize the urgency:

- 90% of adults say expanding access to mental health care should be a priority for elected officials.
- 80% of parents support schools providing access to mental health professionals.

Supporting the Senate proposal to allocate what remains of \$190 million in School Safety National Activities funding—after Project SERV and continuation awards—to the MHSP and SBMH programs in FY26 will expand access in rural and under-resourced communities and build a sustainable workforce pipeline of fully prepared trained professionals ready to serve in schools nationwide. This is a fiscally responsible investment in prevention, community safety, and the long-term health of our children and workforce.

Thank you for your continued leadership and for working together to ensure that every student in America has the support they need to thrive.
